Launceston Art Society workshop on Expressive Portrait Drawing from Photos and from Life.

I was fortunate to attend a full day workshop in Launceston at the RSL (where the Launceston Art Society is based) on Saturday 19 May 2024 with the amazing Clare Holder. The workshop involved drawing in graphite, charcoal or pastels from photos and a live model in the afternoon.

Clare was an engaging and highly experienced teacher and I learnt so much from the class, as I had done next to no real-life drawing. I particularly learnt the value of a NOTAN (a Japanese concept) in preparation for a portrait. A Notan is a simple approach involving a study of light and dark. Clare asked us to do a monochrome portrait as a start. This was a useful exercise in drawing areas of tonal mass.

With the tonal mass approach, the drawing of the eyes became more about drawing the lenses in a pair of glasses due to the need to place the eye properly in the broader eye socket.

I learnt the value of my Conte pastel pencils (properly sharpened to expose more of the pastel) and how blending with paper towel could create a great effect on the paper. I also learnt a different approach to wielding and holding my pastel pencil (more on the side and like a conductor's baton) and the importance of standing at a properly adjusted easel (height wise) to ensure that I could easily view the model and translate my observations to my paper in a way that flowed and utilised the right side of my brain. The class also reinforced the importance of fluid gestural strokes coupled with structure.

The delightful Imogen patiently posed as a model and provided an interesting subject for our work. We also discussed the normal rules of proportion for faces, how different points on the face were generally related, the importance of lighting and the use of tracing paper as a tool to check our work with a view to improvement.

Clare shared her process to help us confidently draw a heard from any perspective. She advised that we should think of the face, for instance, in terms of planes. She discussed the tip, tilt and turn of the head, centre lines (and how they move!), placement of features, lighting and shadow shapes and the importance of edges (hard, soft and lost).

Clare also suggested that we practise seeing abstractly by turning our reference photos upside down. She stressed the importance of squinting to help identify values and avoid confusing detail.

Most importantly, she reinforced the importance of greater personal expression in our art. It is both motivating and inspiring to learn different approaches to portrait painting.

I was delighted to tutor a 4-week class in Term 2 on animal and human portraits. Eleven members signed up for the class. The works produced varied from human portraits (including family members), family pets, birds and wildlife (like lions, tigers and giraffes)

We spent some time on how to draw up a face with rules of thumb regarding relative proportions and positioning of key facial features. There was much laughter and fun and discussion about challenges and lessons learned.

Over the past few weeks The Colour Circle has been holding a few workshops which were well attended.


Leanne Halls' class was a delightful, refreshing learning experience, with beautiful results.

The Heritage Art Group

The Group (HAG) includes artists, who paint together at the Colour Circle studio on Mondays and in Margate on Tuesdays, with a focus on "realism" in oil painting - although a range of themes & media are often included in exhibitions. Works range from finely detailed miniatures to large canvases.

Joan Humble OAM is the lead artist of the Heritage Art Group. She is not only a signature artist of excellence in Tasmania, but also in the worldwide community of art. She was a founding member of ASMA, the Australian Miniature Art Society (Tasmania), elected as an Associate of the Royal Society of Miniature Painters, Gravers & Sculptors in the United Kingdom and elected as a Signature Member of the MAA (Miniature Artists of America), the only Australian so honoured. Joan enjoys immensely, her artistic interaction with this happy group of painters, who originate from many different countries and walks of life.

Originally founded in 1987, seven exhibitions were held as Humble Art & Co. This group was renamed The Heritage Art Group in 1996 & fifteen exhibitions have since been held.

This year's exhibition is entitled "What I Love" and will feature a wide variety of artistic subjects, including many Tasmanian wilderness themes, all with the vibrancy, depth and beautiful hues that oil painting can produce.

Our special guest, artist Michaye Boulter will open the exhibition at 10.30am on Saturday 31 August at the Lady Franklin Gallery, Lenah Valley. Light refreshments will be served, after which the exhibition will be open to the public from 11am – 4pm.



The exhibition will run throughout September with the gallery open every weekend from 11am – 4 pm, finishing on Sunday 29th at 4pm. Members of the Heritage Art Group will be present, to talk about their Art Works and artistic passion. Members of the Heritage Art Group look forward to meeting all visitors to the Lady Franklin Gallery in Lenah Valley throughout September to view their latest exhibition "What I Love".


